IRH Hosts Consultation on Faith, Family Planning and Family Well-being

On April 11-12, 2011 at a consultation hosted by the Institute for Reproductive Health (IRH) and supported by USAID, leaders in the field of global health gathered together at Georgetown University to discuss the intersection of faith, family planning and family well-being. Religion plays an important role in the health of people around the world, both through actual health services provided by faith-based organizations as well as the influence religion has on behavior. However, for many development practitioners and healthcare providers, the role of faith has been considered either irrelevant or misperceived as a barrier. Recent findings have shown the opposite; faith is relevant to improving family health, and the faith sector is willing to lead efforts to improve family health, including family planning.

For people of Muslim and Christian faith, the family is the cornerstone of a stable and peaceful society. Therefore, family health is something that is essential to the faith community. If family planning is seen as a voluntary decisionmaking process that begins between couples about the appropriate timing, spacing and number of children in order to maximize the health and welfare of the family, many

groups are able to come together around this previously controversial issue. Through appropriate timing and spacing of pregnancies, infant and maternal morbidity and mortality is reduced. Furthermore, family planning allows parents to devote ample time, attention and resources to each child as they grow.

During this meeting, participants from over 30 global health organizations were able to find common ground on the role of faith, family planning and gender in global health. Numerous examples were shared about successful partnerships between secular and faith-based organizations as well as interfaith collaboration resulting in improved access to family planning information and services.

CycleTel™ Launch in India

CyceTel, the mobile health service that offers the Standard Days Method® (SDM) directly to women's mobile phones, was launched this month in India. Guatemala Consultation on Youth

On April 8, 2011, IRH hosted a consultation on "Working with Very Young Adolescents (VYAs) on Health Issues" in Guatemala City in collaboration with APROFAM. The meeting's objectives were to:

- Present results of the 2nd Edition of *My Changing Body*, evaluated in Guatemala and Rwanda with 10-14 year old adolescents and parents,
- 2. Share experiences and best practices from working with this age group on sexual and reproductive health, and
- 3. Identify next steps and priorities for research, resource mobilization and existing projects in this field.

The meeting was attended by youth-serving organizations from throughout Guatemala as well as the Ministry of Health and Ministry of Education. IRH disseminated the advocacy brief titled, "Promoting the Health and Well-Being of Very Young Adolescents (VYAs)" which is now available in <u>English</u> and <u>Spanish</u>.

New Publication on Evaluation Methodologies

Are interventions to increase access to family planning successful in addressing unmet need? Many studies have suggested that interventions have relatively little effect on reducing unmet need, but this may be for methodological reasons. A study conducted by IRH in Jharkhand, India shows that when only women who want to avoid pregnancy and are at risk of pregnancy are included in the analysis, effects can be significant.
