IRH is addressing gaps in adolescent-focused programming and related program evaluation. Between the ages of 10 and 14, girls and boys are going through puberty and beginning to solidify their identities, gain knowledge and experiences, and develop attitudes and skills that lay the foundation for future sexual and reproductive health (SRH) and social well-being. Yet, programs designed for the needs and developmental stage of 10-14 year olds, often known as very young adolescents (VYAs), are still rare.

IRH is leading an effort to renew program focus on VYAs through evidence-based, innovative program designs and partner collaboration. In June 2010, IRH hosted a Technical Consultation on "Advancing Program and Research/Evaluation Practices for Curriculum-based Programs Reaching Very Young Adolescents (VYAs)." The final meeting report is available for download below.

IRH is also contributing to new methodologies to evaluate VYA programs tailored to adolescents' intellectual development level. These methods use creative, participatory, game-based techniques that engage youth in SRH program evaluation, while also serving to operationalize and measure changes in gender attitudes and norms, self-esteem and other constructs that are not easily measured by standard methodologies. They were developed and tested during evaluations of VYA programs in Nepal, Rwanda and Guatemala conducted in collaboration with Save the Children, Catholic Relief Services and APROFAM. For more detailed information on the evaluation techniques, refer to IRH's presentation given at the USAID Mini University in October.
